

Combating Brain Drain with Strategic Housing Solutions

In Bucks County, essential workers such as EMTs, daycare providers, first-year teachers, and firefighters are increasingly unable to afford to live where they serve, a community condition referred to as "brain drain." This phenomenon, where skilled and essential workers leave a particular area because they cannot afford to live there, results in a shortage of critical local talent and services, impacting not only their lives but also threatening the overall economic health and safety of our community.

One significant contributing factor is obstructive zoning and land-use regulations which restrict the types and quantities of housing that can be built, often leading to higher home prices and limited availability. This often discourages vital workers from relocating to areas where they can earn high wages but would be forced to pay too much in housing costs. To counteract this, we need innovative and diverse housing solutions. "Missing Middle Housing", such as townhomes, duplexes, triplexes, and accessory dwelling units (ADUs), provides a balanced and effective alternative to traditional higher-cost, single family housing models. Other solutions can include converting underutilized commercial buildings to residential use and allowing housing around office parks.

Habitat for Humanity of Bucks County's homeownership program directly addresses this challenge affecting working families by offering attainable homeownership and opportunity for inclusion of these vital citizens in the local community. We remain deeply invested in every home we sell, ensuring long-term stability and community growth.



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For our county to truly thrive, it is imperative that all local communities partner with, support, and advocate for attainable housing solutions. Together, we can ensure that more essential workers have the opportunity to live right here, where we need them to work!

Mariela's Journey to Homeownership with Habitat for Humanity

Mariela, a single mother of three, spent fourteen years living in a two-bedroom apartment, dreaming of a home where her children could have space and a backyard where they can play. Her rent continued to climb but her wages barely kept up. Despite her challenges, including storm damage to her apartment that temporarily displaced her family, she never gave up. With careful financial management, she improved her credit and was pre-approved for a mortgage, but still homeownership was out of reach due to high market prices.

Encouraged by her daughter, who learned of Habitat's new project in

Home Repair

Safe Homes, Stronger Futures: Habitat **Bucks' Mission in Action at Richland** Meadows

Habitat's Home Repair Program has significantly impacted residents in Richland Meadows Mobile Home Park in Quakertown, assisting ten families with crucial home repairs that enhance their living conditions and safety.

Our outreach began by contacting the park manager and distributing flyers to inform residents about available assistance. Repair requests addressed various critical needs, including roof repairs, ramp installations for a mother and son to improve mobility, and water heater replacements. A notable project involved converting a tub to a shower for a person using a motorized wheelchair, with plans to install a ramp next, highlighting our commitment to accessibility.





Additionally, unsafe flooring issues were resolved by replacing particle board with sturdy plywood, ensuring safer and more durable floors. Plumbing and electrical repairs were prioritized, as our team emphasized the dangers of electrical issues and potential water damage from leaking faucets.

These efforts improve residents' immediate living conditions and contribute to the longterm stability and safety of their homes. Habitat Bucks' commitment to helping families maintain safe and decent housing continues to make a profound difference in communities like Richland Meadows.
